



# State Motor Scooter Registration and Licensing Requirements

#### Issue

Provide motor scooter registration and licensing requirements in all 50 states. This report updates OLR Report 2020-R-0257.

#### Summary

The term "motor scooter" usually refers to two- or three-wheeled vehicles with seats, relatively small motors, and low top speeds. It is sometimes used interchangeably with "moped" (i.e. a vehicle with both bicycle pedals and a motor). In Connecticut, these vehicles typically fall under the definition of "motor-driven cycles," which do not need to be registered with the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) before being operated on public roads.

In the 2025 legislative session, the legislature expanded the definition of motor-driven cycle, in part to clarify the classification of similar electric powered scooters. Effective October 1, 2025, a motordriven cycle is any motorcycle, scooter, or bicycle with an attached motor that has a seat height at least 26 inches high and a gas, electric, or hybrid motor that has a capacity less than 50 cubic centimeters (cc) or a wattage of 3,700 or less or that produces 5 brake horsepower (BHP) or less (PA 25-159, § 39). It excludes electric bicycles (e-bikes) and electric scooters (e-scooters), which are regulated more similarly to bicycles.

As micromobility (i.e. using small, low-speed vehicles for transport, particularly in urban environments) has increased in popularity and different types of vehicles and devices have come to market, the policy landscape pertaining to these vehicles has become increasingly complex and



continues to evolve. State definitions of vehicle categories and regulatory structures reflect this complexity. This report focuses on registration and licensing requirements for categories of vehicles similar to those that fall under Connecticut's motor-driven cycle definition; we exclude vehicles that fall into the e-bike or e-scooter categories from our comparison.

Thirty-six states appear to require all motor scooters to be registered before they may be driven on public roads, while 14 exempt a category of motor scooters from registration. Connecticut and South Dakota appear to exempt the broadest category of motor scooters from registration. Nearly all states require some form of license to operate a motor scooter. Some require just a standard driver's license, some require a motorcycle credential, and some have a special permit or restricted license for motor scooter operation. We identified four states that do not appear to require any license or permit for some motor scooters.

#### Connecticut

# Legislative History of the Categorization of Motor Scooters and Motorized Bicycles

Prior to 1976, scooters and mopeds were considered motorcycles. But in 1976, the legislature defined "bicycles with helper motors" and removed them from the laws' motorcycle requirements, instead treating them as bicycles. The legislature did so, in part, at the urging of moped manufacturers, distributors, and dealers, who touted mopeds as possessing more of the qualities of bicycles than motorcycles. In 2008, the legislature replaced "bicycle with helper motor" with the broader category of "motor-driven cycles," which were motorcycles, motor scooters, or bicycles with attached motors that had a seat height of at least 26 inches and a maximum output of 5 BHP. In 2013, the legislature changed the limit from 5 BHP to 50cc. (OLR Report 2015-R-0253 provides a detailed legislative history of these changes.)

In 2018, the legislature passed a law to create a category for electric bicycles (e-bikes) and generally require them to be treated like bicycles under the law (PA 18-165). By law, an e-bike is a bicycle that has operable foot pedals and an electric motor of less than 750 watts and falls into one of three classifications (see Table 1 below). In doing so, the legislature excluded e-bikes from the definition of motor-driven cycle. E-bikes do not require registration or a driver's license, but someone must be age 16 or older to ride a Class 3 e-bike.

In 2025, the legislature modified the definition of motor-driven cycle again (PA 25-159, § 39). They did so in part to address ambiguity in the treatment of two- and three-wheeled vehicles powered by an electric motor. Because the motor-driven cycle limit was measured in cc (a measurement that only applies to internal combustion engines), it was unclear how similar vehicles powered by an electric motor would be classified. Under the new law (which takes effect October 1, 2025), motor-driven cycle includes motorcycles, scooters, and bicycles with attached motors that have a seat height of at least 26 inches and a gas, electric, or hybrid motor that has a capacity less than 50cc or a wattage of 3,700 or less or that produces 5 BHP or less. The definition excludes vehicles classified as "e-bikes" or "electric scooters" (see below). The act also expanded the motor-driven cycle category to include motorized unicycles, which are one-wheeled vehicles with floorboards that can be stood upon while riding or with foot rests for the operator.

The 2025 law also created the category of "electric scooter," defined as a two- or three-wheeled device that (1) weighs 100 pounds or less; (2) has handlebars; (3) is designed to be ridden in an upright or seated position; (4) is powered by electric and human power; and (5) has a maximum speed of 20 mph (PA 25-159, § 38). It did so by replacing and expanding the prior definition of "electric foot scooter" to include heavier devices and allow them to have a seat. In 2019, when the definition was initially enacted (PA 19-162), this category included only scooters that riders stand on when riding. It was designed to regulate the growing use of e-scooters, especially through scooter rental companies (e.g., Lime, Bird, and Veo). Some of these companies now provide scooters with seats for rental, and the new law clarifies the treatment of these vehicles by carving them out of the definition of motor-driven cycle.

#### Motor Scooter Registration and License Requirements

Connecticut law requires motor vehicles to be registered with DMV, but it exempts motor-driven cycles and electric foot scooters (now "e-scooters," see above) from the definition of "motor vehicles" (CGS § 14-1(59)). Thus, owners of scooters that fall under these categories do not need to register the scooters with DMV in order to operate them on public roads.

Connecticut law generally requires motor-driven cycle riders to hold a driver's license, but they do not need to hold a motorcycle endorsement. E-scooters are generally treated as bicycles under the law and do not require a driver's license (CGS §§ 14-286, et seq.).

Motor scooters that do not fall under the motor-driven cycle or e-scooter categories are generally considered motorcycles and require registration and a motorcycle endorsement. (If a scooter has a seat height of less than 26 inches, it is considered a "mini-motorcycle" and may not be operated on public roads or sidewalks (<u>CGS § 14-289i</u>). Thus, these vehicles cannot be registered.)

#### Other States' Laws

#### **Definitions**

The categorization of motor scooters and moped-type vehicles varies widely among states. The definitions are based on one or more of the following characteristics: (1) number of wheels; (2) the presence of a seat and its height; (3) the presence of a motor or the motor type (e.g., internal combustion engine (ICE) or electric); (4) the vehicle's or motor's maximum capacity or output; (5) the vehicle's top speed; (6) whether the vehicle has pedals or can be powered by human power; and (7) the power drive or transmission, and whether it is automatic or requires shifting.

In Table 2 below, for each state, we list each defined category that encompasses vehicles similar to those falling under Connecticut's motor-driven cycle category. Some states have a category for motor-driven cycles that matches the federal definition (i.e. a motorcycle with a motor producing 5 BHP or less (49 C.F.R. § 571.3)). Federal vehicle safety regulations use this category to exclude these vehicles from certain equipment requirements that apply to motorcycles, and some states similarly do so in their equipment laws. We excluded this category for states that treat these vehicles the same as motorcycles for licensing and registration purposes.

Most states have adopted laws defining e-bikes with the three-class structure and regulating them similarly to bicycles ("Overview of Electric Bike Regulations," People for Bikes). Many states have also adopted laws regulating the use of e-scooters ("States Roll Out Electric Scooter Laws," National Conference of State Legislatures). Like Connecticut, most states generally exclude e-bikes and e-scooters from other categories of low-powered cycles and scooters. We excluded e-bike and e-scooter categories from the table below and noted if an included category explicitly excluded these vehicles (states laws may still exclude them even if they do not do so in the definition).

As in Connecticut, motor scooters that do not meet the definitions included in the table below and do not fall into the e-bike or e-scooter category are generally considered motorcycles and require registration and motorcycle credentials.

#### Registration

Thirty-six states require all motor scooters to be registered before they may be driven on public roads. In some states (e.g., California and Maryland), it is only a one-time registration that does not need to be periodically renewed like most vehicle registrations.

Fourteen states, including Connecticut, exempt a category of motor scooters from registration. Of these states, Connecticut and South Dakota appear to have the broadest category of registration-exempt vehicles. Eleven of these states have a limit on the speed capability of registration-exempt vehicles in addition to limits on engine power/capacity. The most common limit is a top speed of 30 mph, but the limits range from 20 mph to 35 mph. Additionally, five of these states limit the registration-exempt category to vehicles that have pedals for human propulsion in addition to the motor. South Dakota and Connecticut include non-pedal vehicles in their registration-exempt category and do not specify a speed limit. South Dakota's category has a 50cc limit, but it does not have a horsepower limit or specify a limit for electric-powered vehicles.

#### Licensing

The licensing requirements for operating a motor scooter or moped type vehicle vary considerably by state. As displayed in Table 2 below, in the majority of states, a standard driver's license allows someone to operate these vehicles. However, as discussed above, states do not uniformly define motor scooters and mopeds and many have multiple vehicle categories that cover these vehicle types. For example, a number of states (1) separately define "motor-driven cycles," which generally may have a more powerful motor, and (2) require operators to have a motorcycle license or endorsement (e.g., Arkansas and Idaho). Some states require a motorcycle license or endorsement for all motor scooters or mopeds, such as Mississippi, Texas, and West Virginia. Additionally, several states offer a restricted license or special permit that allows younger riders (typically age 14 or 15) to operate these vehicles (e.g., Alabama, Alaska, Arkansas, Indiana, and Iowa). In some of these states, older individuals without a driver's license are also eligible to apply for a restricted license or special permit.

We identified four states that do not appear to require any license or permit for at least some categories of motor scooters or mopeds (North Carolina, Oklahoma, Vermont, and Virginia). Additionally, some states generally allow local governments to regulate the operation of these vehicles within their jurisdiction. For example, motorized scooter operators in Oklahoma (1) do not need a driver's license unless one is required by local ordinance and (2) must be at least age 14 unless a local ordinance requires an older age.
