"AN ACT UPDATING PRISON RAPE ELIMINATION STANDARDS."

1 Strike subsection (b) of section 1 in its entirety and insert the
2 following in lieu thereof:

3 "(b) Such standards include, but are not limited to:

4 (1) Zero tolerance of sexual abuse;

5 (2) Contracting with other entities for the confinement of inmates or
6 detainees;

7 (3) Inmate or detainee supervision;

8 (4) Heightened protection for vulnerable detainees;

9 (5) Limits to cross-gender viewing and searches;

10 (6) Accommodating inmates or detainees with special needs;

11 (7) Hiring and promotion decisions;

- 12 (8) Assessment and use of monitoring technology;
- 13 (9) Evidence protocol and forensic medical examinations;
- 14 (10) Agreements with outside public entities and community service
15 providers, including, but not limited to, for purposes of ensuring access

64 following in lieu thereof:

65 "(d) Not later than January 1, 2027, and annually thereafter, the
66 Commissioner of Correction shall report, in accordance with the
67 provisions of section 11-4a, to the joint standing committee of the
68 General Assembly having cognizance of matters relating to the
69 Department of Correction, concerning the following: (1) Training
70 provided to department staff concerning compliance with the Prison
71 Rape Elimination Act, 34 USC 30301 et seq., in effect as of January 1,
72 2024; (2) the number of reports of sexual assault against a person who is
73 incarcerated or staff of the department and the types of sexual assault
74 reported; and (3) how many of such reports were investigated and the
75 outcome of each such investigation."
