

Public Safety Terminology: Police Officers, Defined

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Issue

Identify Connecticut’s statutory definitions for “police officer” and briefly describe the statutes that use them.

Summary

In general, “police officer” is not specifically defined in a large majority of the dozens of statutes that use the phrase, but there are currently seven separate definitions for “police officer” that collectively have six different meanings. Four of these definitions are used for purposes of an individual statute. Among the others, the most used definition was established for purposes of the laws governing the structure and powers of the Police Officer Standards and Training Council (POST) ([CGS § 7-294a\(9\)](#)). The definitions are detailed below along with brief descriptions of the statutes that expressly use them.

Police Officer Terms

POST Definition

[CGS § 7-294a](#) establishes several definitions for specified POST-related laws (referred to hereafter as POST definitions). Under this statute, a “police officer” is:

1. a sworn member of an organized local police department or the State Police;
2. an appointed constable who performs criminal law enforcement duties;

3. a special police officer appointed by the Department of Emergency Services and Public Protection (DESPP) commissioner to, generally, (a) police state buildings or lands, (b) investigate public assistance fraud, (c) secure Department of Children and Families (DCF) buildings or facilities, or (d) police the premises of a utility or transportation company; or
4. any member of a law enforcement unit who performs police duties.

The statute defines “law enforcement unit” as any state or municipal agency or department (or tribal agency or department created and governed under a memorandum of agreement) whose primary functions include enforcing criminal or traffic laws; preserving public order; protecting life and property; or preventing, detecting, or investigating crime.

The Attorney General’s office has reviewed these definitions, noting that they do not define what “primary functions” or “police duties” are. However, the office has interpreted “primary functions” as including those which are objectively integral to the proper performance of the unit’s overall duties and responsibilities. Additionally, the office has construed that “police duties” encompass one or more of the following activities: (1) enforcing criminal or traffic laws; (2) preserving public order; (3) protecting life or property; and (4) preventing, detecting, or investigating crime (i.e. bringing the examples listed in the “law enforcement unit” definition into the one for “police officer”). Based on this understanding, the office listed several positions as qualifying as police officers under the statute, such as animal control officers ([Atty. Gen. Op. 1993-028](#); see also OLR Report [2008-R-0670](#), [Atty. Gen. Op. 2013-006](#), and [Atty. Gen. Op. 2023-002](#)).

Appendix 1 below lists and briefly describes the statutes that use the POST definition of “police officer.”

Police Recording Equipment Definition

The state’s main law governing body and dashboard camera use and recordings by law enforcement defines “police officer” similar to the above POST definition. Specifically, as (1) a sworn member of a law enforcement unit or (2) any member of a law enforcement unit who performs police duties. Under this statute, “law enforcement unit” has the same meaning as its POST definition ([CGS § 29-6d](#), as amended by [PA 25-100](#) and [PA 26-45](#), § 15).

Two other laws incorporate this police officer definition. One generally involves state funding for police recording device and service purchases by municipalities for police officers and others ([CGS § 7-277b](#)), and the second governs the use of physical force by peace officers, police officers, and others in making arrests or preventing escape ([CGS § 53a-22](#), as amended by [PA 25-29](#), § 9, and [PA 26-14](#), § 4).

Civil Restraining Order Definition

The law governing civil restraining orders defines “police officer” as a (1) State Police officer or (2) sworn member of a municipal police department ([CGS § 46b-15](#), as amended by [PA 25-78](#), § 14).

Two public health statutes also use this definition. Both of these statutes generally require police officers and others to maintain certain items in their vehicles. One requires certain communication aids for helping interact with people with autism spectrum disorder, cognitive impairment, or nonverbal learning disorder ([CGS § 19a-910](#)), and the other requires copies of documents concerning (1) behavioral and mental health evaluation and treatment resources available to children and (2) services and resources available to victims of domestic violence ([CGS § 19a-910a](#)).

Single-Use Definitions

A criminal procedure statute on the use of electronic defense weapons separately defines “police officer” the same as the above civil restraining order definition. This law generally requires DESPP and municipal police departments that authorize their police officers to use an electronic defense weapon to adopt and maintain a written policy that meets or exceeds POST’s model policy ([CGS § 54-1t](#)).

A higher education statute concerning a Police Officer Loan Subsidy Program for subsidizing interest rates on Connecticut Higher Education Supplemental Loan Authority loans to police officers employed in a distressed municipality defines “police officer” as a sworn member of a municipal police department ([CGS § 10a-247d](#)).

A labor law that addresses workers’ compensation eligibility for police officers and others for post-traumatic stress injury defines “police officer” as having the same meaning as the above POST definition but excluding an officer of a law enforcement unit of the Mashantucket Pequot or Mohegan tribes ([CGS § 31-294k](#)).

The Alvin W. Penn Racial Profiling Prohibition Act, which generally prohibits police officers from engaging in racial profiling, defines “police officer” as a (1) police officer within a municipal police department or DESPP or (2) person with the same authority under state law to make arrests or issue citations for violating any motor vehicle law and to enforce them as a municipal police officer or State Police officer has in his or her respective jurisdiction. The law specifies that this second type includes:

1. special police officers appointed by the DESPP commissioner for state property;

2. special police officers or State Police officers enforcing traffic regulations at Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services or DCF facilities;
3. police officers appointed by DESPP for a utility or transportation company;
4. the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) commissioner, deputy commissioners, and designated salaried inspectors (who are authorized, by law, to enforce motor vehicle statutes and regulations);
5. State Capitol Police officers;
6. UConn and Connecticut State Colleges and Universities police;
7. State Police officers enforcing traffic regulations at the Department of Veterans Affairs; and
8. fire police (who, by law, have powers over traffic control and regulation) ([CGS § 54-1m](#), as amended by [PA 25-65](#), § 18).
